Children under the age of five are twice as likely to die in a home fire than the rest of the population, and child-playing fires are the leading cause of fire deaths among preschoolers*** About 300 people per year are killed and \$280 million in property is destroyed in fires attributed to children playing with fire***

Protecting Children from Wildfire Smoke and Ash Background •Children are especially at risk for health effects from exposure to wildfire smoke and ash, mostly because their lungs are still growing •Wildfire concerns include the fire itself, the smoke and ash, and the chemicals from materials that have burned, such as furniture

Children and Fire: By the Numbers • Children age 14 and under make up 10 to 15% of all fire deaths • More than half of all child fire deaths happen to children under the age of 5 • Fire injuries happen most often to those under age 4 The 10 to 14 age group also experience a significant number of fire injuries • Boys are at a higher

Wildfires and Children - Acute Phase

Wildfires expose children to a number of environmental hazards, eg, fire, smoke, psychological stimuli, and the byproducts of combustion of wood, plastics, and other chemicals released from burning structures and furnishings During the acute phase of wildfire activity, the major hazards to children are fire and smoke Acute stress from fire

Fire Risk to Children in 2010 - U.S. Fire Administration

These children accounted for 10 percent of fire deaths The youngest children were especially hard hit — 57 percent of child fire deaths affected

- Teach children from a young age that fire is a tool for adults— not a toy!
- When children are older, begin teaching them the proper uses of fire
- Teach children not to touch any matches or lighters
- Set a good example Children learn fire safety from others
- Teach your baby sitters about fire safety Have a list of emergency

How to Conduct a Child Care Fire Drill

A fire escape plan and regular practice drills help children learn how to respond appropriately and not hide under a bed or in a closet if a fire occurs It is important that a fire drill is not a scary experience for children Conduct a fire drill once a month Do the drill at different times, such as nap time, meal time, play time etc, to help

Children under the age of 5 make up only 7% of the American population, but account for 23% of the country's fire deaths Children generally do not understand what fire is capable of doing, or how quickly a fire can rage out of control At the youngest age possible, teach your children that matches and cigarette lighters are not toys to be

10 Tips for Keeping Children Safe in a WILDFIRE

Use simple words that even young children can understand 2 Know your risk Learn about your area's risk of wildfires, particularly if you live near forests, in rural areas, or in a dry climate Contact your local fire department, state forestry office, or other emergency response agencies for information on fire laws and wildfire risk 3
